

#### CONSERVATION



"How wonderful it is that nobody need wait a single moment before staring to improve the world." -Anne Frank

A whole new year of opportunities to converse, to care for our world opens before us with our New Year 2021.

One important improvement we can make is to keep our cats inside and influence others to do the same. According to the Michigan Audubon Society's Winter 2020 Jack Pine Warbler Magazine, "Cat predation of birds is the most impactful human-caused direct threat to birds in Norther America. Free-ranging domestic cats kill an estimated 2.4 billion birds and 12.3 billion mannals each year in North America. Nearly one-third of all birds have been lost since 1970.

In addition, domestic cats are the number one carrier of rabies. Cats are the only known reproductive host for the Toxoplasma gondi parasite causing Toxoplasmosis. The parasite eggs are excreted in cat feces and humans can be exposed throught inhalation or ingestion-like children playing in parks or your backyard, garden, and sandboxes. The disease can cause miscarriages, blindness, birth defects, developmental problems, memory loss or death, and can also be transmitted to wildlife.

Even well-fed free-roaming cats continue to follow their instincts and prey upon wildlife and birds, even with a full belly.

And cats can happlily exist indoors. With plenty of indoor enrichment opportunities, your cat can live a full, satisfying life with no need to go outdoors if you provide cat strucures such as cat condo trees, puzzles to get threats, and a variety of toys. Even wall shelves at various heights will work.

If you feel your cat wants to go outdoors, remember that leashes are not just for dogs.

Cats can learn to wear a harness and enjoy a walk on a leash and you both can exercise.

In the end, keeping cats inside is a positive solution for all-for cats (their welfare and safety), for birds, and for you and me (public heath, our peace of mind). Will you make a change at home and encourage your friends, family and community to protect not only birds but also cats?

Other risks for cats outside include:

- insecticides, rodenticides, ferilizers
- exposure to viral infections like feline leukemia virus (FELV), feline immunodefiency virus (FIV) as well as rabies
- internal parasites like roundworms, hookworms, whipworms, heartworms, tapeworms
- car injuries-death
- wounds from cat flights leading to infections, abscesses, medications
- predators like coyotes, foxes, large birds of prey
